

# AJN This Month **On the Cover**



his month's cover photo shows the Northwell Health Nurse Choir performing in the September finale of the NBC television show America's Got Talent (AGT). The group, comprising 18 nurses from New York's Northwell Health system, first performed in November 2020 at a virtual fundraiser for Nurse Heroes, a nonprofit initiative to support nursing education. The group was formed after Northwell's leadership invited its 19,000 nurses to audition for the choir by submitting a 30-second clip. By the end of the summer, the choir had successfully advanced through AGT's competition, and ultimately made it to the finals.

Choir member Winnie Mele, director of perioperative services at Plainview Hospital in Plainview, New York, told AJN that

the group's uplifting performances on the show were intended both to celebrate nursing and to offer a message of hope to fellow nurses in the midst of the pandemic. "We started out by saying, let's get up there and show the nurses who are having trouble finding their resilience that you have to find your joy, whatever it is." The choir also aimed to reassure the public that, as Mele describes, "We know you're frightened, but we're here."

Mele sees a parallel between nursing and lifting up an audience. "The choir is very diverse. If you walked onto a nursing unit at any of the Northwell hospitals, that is what you would see—nurses from all walks of life working toward a common goal. What we did [on AGT] mirrored what we do [as nurses]: bring peace, kindness, and joy to our patients."—Diane Szulecki, editor ▼
